As I See It

Summer seems to be in full swing in South Dakota as we begin to enjoy the beautiful world that God has created. I sometimes find myself complaining about all the work that summer brings (mowing, weeding, etc.), but when I'm reminded of all the wonderful things God has given us to enjoy in this life, the complaining gives way to a feeling of deep gratitude. That's how we should approach life each and every day...with a heart of thanksgiving for a loving God and Father who cares about each one of us and who wants us to live the life that He has planned for us. We have to understand that God hasn't promised us a life free of trials and problems...but He does promise that a life dependant on Him will allow us to live victoriously in whatever circumstances life throws at us. Well, that's my sermon for this time....on to some news about the Jenkins organization.

We recently celebrated National Nursing Home Week (May 9-15) and used this event as an opportunity to pay a special tribute to our residents, staff, and volunteers. A couple of highlights during the week involved two special recognition banquets.....one to honor all those who volunteer at Jenkins during the year, and the other to recognize years of dedicated service by our employees who reached employment milestones. We are extremely grateful for both of these groups (employees and volunteers) who provide the hands-on care and services that make the Jenkins organization a leader in senior health care and housing services.

Several projects are underway around our campus at this time, with some of them being funded by the Walter & Verna Parliament bequest that we received in 2009. For the past several weeks, our Maintenance department has been working diligently on a remodeling of the resident bathing rooms on 2nd floor of Unit 3, and also the Wrage Special Care Unit on 3rd floor of Unit 3. This is a major project, because it involves the creation of two new shower rooms as well as a complete remodeling of the existing tub rooms. To date, the new shower rooms have

been completed and are in use. The tub rooms are about 60% complete, but we're getting closer every day to installing new whirlpool tubs on both floors. A lot of ceramic tile is being used for this project, which gives the rooms a very warm and home-like effect. When this project is completed, all of our resident bathing areas in the facility will have been remodeled to provide a much more residential feel.

Other major projects that will be undertaken this year include: a remodeling of our front entrance, the installation of a new emergency generator, and new windows installed in Unit 2. The front entrance project got underway on May 17th, and will probably take from 3-6 weeks to complete. It calls for the removal of existing concrete in the area, moving the drive-up area further toward the street, and creating an enhanced outdoor seating area for residents and visitors. In addition, a local landscape center will construct some raised flower planters in the area that will be wheelchair accessible. We also plan to add new patio furniture and a specialized glider swing that will accommodate residents in wheelchairs. My thanks to the JLC Foundation Board of Directors for funding the outdoor furniture. When completed, this project will provide a safer and more convenient environment for our residents. The new emergency generator will replace an older generator that is not capable of handling all of our electrical needs in the event of a power outage. The new unit will be a "full-load" generator that could actually run our entire building if that was needed. The window replacement project in Unit 2 will provide new vinyl windows to replace all of the existing windows in that building. The old windows have become warped and they allow drafts during the cold months. The new windows will be custom-made to allow for window air conditioner units to be installed in the summer months. In addition to these major projects, we have also begun developing a master plan to upgrade the resident living areas throughout our facility. The project will involve new paint, window treatments, bedspreads, and furnishings where

needed in resident rooms. Because of the size of our building, we expect this project may take three years to complete. I again want to say how grateful we are to receive financial gifts like the Parliament bequest that allows us to do some special projects that we may not have otherwise been able to do. But I also want to emphasize that we appreciate all donations (regardless of their size) to the Jenkins organization, because these funds allow us to create a more comfortable and attractive living environment for the residents who call Jenkins "home".

The various entities of the Jenkins organization continue to enjoy a high utilization as we move into the summer months. Our senior apartments at 200 Maple Place and Jenkins Townview Apartments are usually full, and Cedar View Assisted Living has remained at full occupancy as well. We are currently conducting a feasibility study regarding a possible addition to Cedar View. The Watertown area seems to have a need for more assisted living beds, and our facility at Cedar View has been too small at 11 beds to remain as financially viable as we'd like it to be. Our Therapy services also continue to be one of the finest in the state, and our outpatient therapy business has grown tremendously in the past year. Jenkins is proud to be able to offer a continuum of senior services that allows people to "age in place" under our umbrella of services.

I want to close my article this time by thanking all of the individuals who have entrusted us with their care, or the care of a loved one. Our wonderful family of employees tries very hard to exceed the needs of the people who come to us for health care or housing services, and we all consider it a privilege to serve each person. As you all go about busy lives this summer, please take some time to thank God for this beautiful world that He's given us to enjoy....and thank Him for the people that He causes to come across your path. It gives us great peace and joy to know that God is in control of our lives - we just need to submit our hearts to Him. Have a blessed summer!

MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S CORNER

What About My Driving Doc?

One of the toughest questions I get is when a family member asks, "What about mom's ability to drive?" There are many different factors that contribute to the answer, such as how is their eyesight? Do they have macular degeneration and cannot see very well at all? Are they blind in one eye? Do they have significant cataracts and might do better after cataract surgery? How about their movement? Can they move freely? Are they able to safely shift gears, apply the brake and accelerate without any problems from arthritis or other things that would interfere with their physical ability to drive the vehicle?

One issue that is obviously very sensitive is when someone's memory is being affected - even if it's happening very slowly. Are they able to drive safely? In this state, we allow someone to drive as long as they pass their driving test and an eye exam, and pay for the new driver's license. The physician's main concern is the patient may not be able to react as quickly as they could 5-10 or more years ago. They may be having some memory problems but they still don't want to give up driving. I always tell patients that physicians try to keep them driving as long as possible....as long as it's safe for the patient and the people around them.

What can you do if you are concerned that maybe one of your relatives can't drive as safely as they use to? One option would be an evaluation at a Sioux Falls driving program. This program puts the person through the steps of actually getting into the vehicle, getting out of the vehicle, driving the vehicle, making judgment calls, etc. but it does cost money. A second option would be to encourage them to take the written and driving examination again if they feel they can do it, just to prove it to themselves and their family. A problem can occur when you suggest this option and they

say, "I am not going to do that since I know I can do it". What do you do then as a family member or a physician? The physician can contact the state Department of Transportation with their concern regarding the person's ability to drive. The DOT writes the person a personal letter asking for their license until they can prove that they can drive. I look at it this way: if you feel that you are a good driver and have no problems whatsoever, then I would encourage you to go take the driving and the written test and show everybody that you can do it. What I don't like to do is to have to contact the Department of Transportation to get someone's license revoked temporarily or to contact the sheriff's department because their driving is putting people around them at risk. I always look at it this way....could I live with myself if their unsafe driving practices would injure someone knowing that I maybe could have done something different?

I even have some patients that temporarily give up driving during the winter months because they know it's icy, or the glare from the snow bothers them and they don't want to take the chance of hurting someone. They then talk to their family in the spring or summer and get a feeling from them whether they can start driving again. I think these are the people that show the most wisdom.

If in doubt about your ability to continue driving, talk with your physician and your family and hear what their thoughts are. Don't be surprised if they express some honest concerns, and then listen to what they have to say. Whether or not we can continue driving is an issue that we all may confront some day, so we should want to approach it with an open mind and then ultimately do what's best for everyone concerned.

Meet Mr. Clive DeWald



Clive DeWald was born in Sioux Falls, SD on June 20, 1920 to Earl and Nina DeWald. Clive graduated from Valley Springs High School in 1937, now known as Brandon Valley. Clive attended one year of college then took a year off to work in the Civilian Conservation Corp to save up some money. He returned to attend SDSU for a year but was still short of attaining his degree.

During this time, Clive was in a “writing club”, referred to as #22. As part of this writing club, each member was required to write to everyone at least once a year but Clive just couldn’t stop writing to #23, Ethyl. They were writing every month, then every week and finally the writing club met at Terrace Park and it was love at first sight! Clive and Ethyl met and soon made their way on dates including one to the State Theatre in which they sat in the balcony. After the show, the couple behind them said they enjoyed watching them instead of the show. Ethyl, with a blushing face, admits they were “neckin’” throughout the entire show. She said they just clicked right away!

They clicked so well that during Leap Year, 1941, it was a common practice that the woman could ask the man to marry him. So, in a kidding, yet cunning way, Ethyl said, “I could ask a man to marry me but I don’t know of anyone.” Clive quickly replied, “You could ask me.” And as they say, the rest was history including a honeymoon with two extra men, Clive’s brother and a friend drove Clive and his new bride out to California. The rest included Clive becoming a Navy Seabee. He was instrumental in the construction of the building that held Enola Gay, the plane and the bomb for Hiroshima. He also helped to build the very first jet; a P-80. Clive returned to South Dakota and completed his degree from SDSU in Vocation Agricultural Education. He joined DeKalb seeds in 1958 where he worked for over 23 years. The next 23 years were spent in Arizona where they “wintered” and where Clive learned to make macrame chairs in which he sold at a nearby country store. He also taught several people how to make the chairs themselves. He volunteered at hospitals in Mesa and right here at Prairie Lakes Hospital for nearly 15 years. Clive’s infectious smile is a welcome sight in the Reflections Unit where Clive resides. We are glad that #22 is a part of our Jenkins Family.

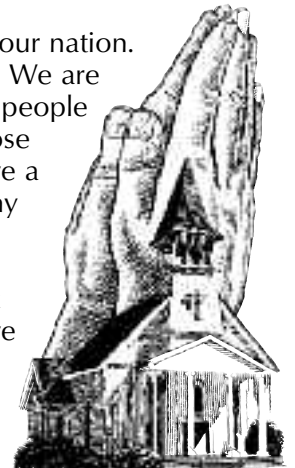
