

## NEW YEAR – NEW NAMES FOR OUR RESIDENT NEIGHBORHOODS ... SAME LOVING, COMPASSIONATE, QUALITY CARE

After much input from staff and residents, Jenkins Living Center has made the decision to re-name the resident neighborhoods in our nursing home, effective in early-2018. For years, the various resident care areas in our building have been referred to as: Unit 1, 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> floors; Unit 2, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors; and Unit 3, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors. Staff have even developed various nicknames over the years (such as “South Second”) to identify specific areas within the facility. The name change is being done at this time in an effort to complete our move from a medical model of care, to a warmer, friendlier feeling of community.

Please note that the new names for care neighborhoods from the north end of our building to the south will be as follows:



North Oak (formerly Unit 1 3<sup>rd</sup> floor)

Oak Center (formerly Unit 2, 3<sup>rd</sup> floor)

Wrage Village (formerly Unit 3, 3<sup>rd</sup> floor; named in honor of Dr. Ted Wrage, Jr.)

North Pine (formerly Unit 1, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor)

Pine Center (formerly Unit 2, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor)

Pine Village (formerly Unit 3, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor)



**Reflections** (our south memory care unit) will remain as **Reflections**.

Each of the six newly named areas will have distinguishable signage and a recognizable logo to help identify the area.

We realize that there will be a bit of a learning curve for our residents, resident family members, physicians, visitors, volunteers, and staff to learn these new names.....but we feel they will become very familiar within a short time.

We want to thank those we serve for their continued loyalty and support. We are truly blessed beyond measure for each and every resident and their family members. As we begin our **60th year** of service in Watertown, our commitment remains that we will be here for those who need our services for many years to come!

## *Message from the President*

I trust that you all had a wonderful celebration of Christmas with family and friends as the whole world paused in late December, if just for a moment, to remember the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Jesus' birth in Bethlehem was an amazing fulfillment of God's perfect plan to redeem mankind from sin. The virgin birth revealed to us God's holiness and His love for us, while Jesus' life and teachings showed us how to live. Finally, His suffering, death, and resurrection showed us God's amazing grace in providing a way of salvation for those who receive Him. Since His birth over 2000 years ago, every person's eternal destiny has been tied to Jesus, whether they know it or not. The Bible tells us that Jesus is both a

cornerstone (the chief foundation on which something is constructed) for believers, and a stumbling block (something that comes in the way) for unbelievers. God wants us to live with Him eternally.....but there is a question that He confronts each of us with that must be answered while we're on this earth - "What will you do with My Son, Jesus?" There are only two answers to that question.....we either accept what He's done and receive Him as our Lord and Savior, or we reject Jesus in favor of living for ourselves. Receiving Jesus establishes Him as a cornerstone in our lives that will eternally give us hope and provide us with truth to live by; whereas, rejecting Him leads us down a path where we rely only on ourselves and the worldly things that may give momentary satisfaction but will never truly satisfy our souls. My friends, if you haven't already - choose the way that gives peace and joy in this life, and provides the way to eternal life.

You will note on the front page of this edition of our newsletter that we are planning to implement new names for our resident care neighborhoods that are designed to project a feeling of community rather than the standard medical model. Institutional-sounding designations like "Unit 1, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor", or "South 3<sup>rd</sup>", are being replaced with warmer, friendlier names like "North Pine", "Oak Center", and "Wrage Village". We're proud of all the efforts that we've made over the years in creating a caring community where residents and staff become one big family, and we feel that these name changes will be a part of that process. I know that familiarity with the new names won't happen overnight for residents, staff, families, and physicians, but we're confident that they will catch on quickly and become the new norm in a short period of time. Thanks to all of you for your patience as we make this transition.

Each year, the South Dakota Department of Health conducts an unannounced inspection (called a state survey) of our facility to determine if we're in compliance with hundreds of federal and state regulations. This year's survey took place on October 2-4, 2017, and resulted in 3 federal deficiencies and 1 deficiency under state regulations. Our required Plan of Correction has been accepted by the Health Dept., but one item that has yet to be installed is a new door locking and alarm system for first-floor exit doors in our facility. Our current system alarms at either our Reception Desk or Unit 2, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor nurses station when an exit door is breached. Staff are then dispatched to the door that has alarmed to ensure that it wasn't a nursing home resident that accidentally walked out of the building. Our solution to this problem is to install new delayed-egress locks on all of the first-floor exit doors (17 of them) in our building. This system will allow entrance to the building from the outside, but will then lock the exit door. If a person who wants to exit pushes on the door continuously for a period of 30 seconds (per local fire codes), the door will unlock, but an audible alarm will sound. However, that whole unpleasant process can be avoided by simply entering a code on the keypad adjacent to the doors. In our current three memory care units, the doors will actually now be locked at all times, but exiting for visitors will be facilitated by the use of the keypads. The new system is set to be installed in January of 2018, and a letter will be sent out to resident family members before it is officially activated.

The long term care side of our nation's health care system has always faced financial challenges due to the high number of Medicaid residents for which we provide care. In an average nursing home, nearly two-thirds of the residents are Medicaid beneficiaries. Typically, Medicaid payments fall well short of the actual cost of providing care, with a facility needing to make up the difference through private pay rates and the higher Medicare reimbursement paid for rehabilitation services. The result of that payer mix is typically a net margin for the average nursing home of around 1.9%. Most companies would not stay in business for such a low profit margin, but those of us who work in long term care view our work as a ministry as much as it is a business, so we're in it for the long haul. However, our jobs just got even tougher after South Dakota Governor Dennis Daugaard released his fiscal 2019 state budget which calls for a 0% increase in Medicaid rates. I don't blame the Governor because he's trying to deal with a bleak state revenue outlook due to a slumping agriculture economy and lower sales tax revenue due to online shopping. But the reality we're left with in long term care is that we somehow have to manage rising labor, insurance, and supply costs with no additional Medicaid dollars to help. As an industry, we'll find a way to make it work because we're committed to caring for the special people God sends our way. However, the only way to create long term stability for the growing number of people needing our services is to develop a sustainable funding system for Medicaid providers that is not as susceptible to every economic whim. We'll keep fighting the good fight on behalf of the residents we care for.

As we enter our budgeting cycle for the coming fiscal year, I'm reminded of how blessed we are within the Jenkins organization to employ over 290 caring people who provide personal care and services to our nursing home and Cedar View Assisted Living residents, and also our apartment tenants at 200 Maple Place and Townview Apartments. We always strive to exceed the expectations of those who reside in one of our facilities, and we're committed to caring for the whole person....spirit, soul, and body. To that end, I want our readers to know how much we appreciate your prayers on behalf of our residents, tenants, and staff. May God bless you all as we again wait eagerly for the hope and promise of Spring!



## Ramona "Mona" Rudebusch

"Mother Goose"

Meet Ramona, "Mona" or "Mother Goose" Rudebusch. Ramona was born in to what you could say was a large family. Just 1 of 13 children born to Elmer and Gladys Knopf, Ramona was #6 and was girl #4. Mona was born on September 15, 1932 as daughter of a well-digger father and a homemaker mother. They grew up around the Summit, SD area where Mona graduated from high school. Her dad, Elmer was 100% German but her mother had different nationalities. Mona said they were a 'mix', which she likes to kiddingly refer to as "Heinz 57."

As you can imagine with 13 kids under one roof, beds were limited not only by space but by the number of children that could fit in each bed which was typically three to a bed. As young children, there were no excuses when it came to missing school and Elmer would make certain of that. Even in inclement weather, he would get his team of horses ready for the trip to the small country school. Mona recalls climbing into the wagon with their pile of blankets. Her dad would then place a metal bucket filled with hot coals in the center of the wagon to keep the kids warm on their wintry journey. Upon return from school, and sometimes even before, each kid was responsible for specific chores both inside and outside.

Dancing was always a hit for kids in the '40-'50s so many would frequent dance halls. On one particular night, Mona met the love of her life at a dance hall! You see, while one young Bud Rudebusch was courting one Shirley Knopf, his brother, Bob spotted another beautiful girl, Ramona Knopf, on the dance floor. And as they say, the rest was history. Mona and Bob were married on November 18, 1949 when Mona was just 17 years old. So two sisters, Mona & Shirley married the Rudebusch brothers and as a result, this made their children—double cousins! They were actually more like brothers and sisters and still are today! Mona and Bob had four sons and one daughter. (Larry, Ricky, Susan Marie (deceased), David, Julie and Bobby. The family has now grown to include 86 grandchildren, great grandchildren and great, great grandchildren.

Bob and Mona made their first home in Vermillion where Bob was an electrician. But after a few years and two kids later, they returned to the Ortley area to farm and *garden!* Mona grew a huge garden and either canned or froze everything. Mona would always make plenty of food so if anyone would come to the door, she would have plenty and demanded they sit down and eat. Everyone was welcome at the Rudebusch house! It wasn't anything for Mona to make a "canner" full of soup or countless home-made lunches for those working in the field. Mona helped out in the fields when she could, but when it came to driving tractors, especially on hills, she left that up to the kids. Mona was not fond of hills!

Ramona was very active in the community and church, to include serving as the superintendent of the Ortley Sunday School. She was involved with the Senior Citizens Center of Ortley and held many offices in the Ortley Free Lutheran Church. She was also a big part of the Ortley VFW Ladies Auxiliary and served as President for many years. For 18 summers, Ramona was the head cook at Pickrel Lake Lutheran Bible Camp where all the campers called her Mom. After the kids were older, she started selling AVON.

But perhaps one of her hidden secrets was 'her' geese. Ramona somehow developed special relationships with nearly 500 geese, earning the namesake, "Mother Goose". She was able to "talk" with them and when she would call for them they would come flying in or waddling to her voice. When she said it's time to be quiet, they would quiet down. People just could not figure out how she did it but "Mother Goose", indeed!

We are grateful for Ramona to share in her life here at Jenkins!

## Tips for Visitors

I am writing this the first week of December when a lot of people are planning on getting together for the holidays. I asked Helen, who is one of my very nice 90 year old patients, about what I should write in this newsletter and she said the topic of visitation. She had some very good suggestions for when friends and family come to visit.

### Limit Your Visit Time

Helen suggested maybe calling before coming; although it's not an absolute necessity, it can be polite so the loved one can be prepared for guests. It can be easier for both parties if the visits are shorter and more frequent rather than an extended period of time, although this can be a little tough when traveling a far distance to visit.

### Arrive on Time

If you were planning on arriving at 10:00 o'clock then don't show up early at 8:00 o'clock or at noon. Try and show up on time. Maybe they have something else planned that particular day and they are waiting for you to show up. Most important, if your plans change and you can no longer visit, be certain to tell them you can't make it.

### Death of Spouse

If sending a condolence card for the death of a spouse, be sure to put an address on it so the recipient doesn't have to look for it. If you write a memorial check to the family don't expect them to take it to the church if it is made out to the church or some other entity. It would be easier for you to just mail it in yourself directly and leave a note in the card saying that a memorial was sent in the person's honor.

### Moving Things

If you are at someone's house and move something, such as a chair to get closer to them, be sure to put it back where you found it. Things around their room may be placed in a specific spot so that they will be within reach when they need it or perhaps it's difficult to move by themselves. This would also apply to a blanket, a towel, etc.

## *The House By The Side of the Road*

### *The Wild, Wild West... West of Walmart*

I remember the first Sunday morning I drove into Watertown ten years ago. From New Jersey to Minnesota, from Minnesota to British Columbia, from British Columbia to Ohio, from Ohio to Minnesota, and from Minnesota to South Dakota. It had taken 12 years to get here.

It was an October morning in 2007. We had moved from Ohio back to Fergus Falls at the end of August as I had gotten sick while serving the church in Ohio. My immune system and respiratory systems had been compromised and the doctors said that I would heal better further west where the air quality was better. So back to Fergus Falls we went 10 years after we had first left seminary for British Columbia and then Ohio. For those five months at the end of 2007 I began to see a pulmonary doctor in Fergus and Barb and I worked for a human service agency in Fergus Falls. Though my voice was weak yet, with a microphone the synod approved me to serve as pulpit supply as needed Sunday mornings from Northern Minnesota to the Dakotas.

That October morning in 2007 I was coming to South Dakota for the first time. For the first time I thought, I was coming here to the real "Wild, Wild West". Except that as I came off the Interstate, I saw the IHOP and then the Walmart and then all the stores along Hwy 212. It didn't look like the old west I had heard of. That afternoon after the service I headed back to Fergus, never imagining that this would become our home.

In December that year the friends of that little church invited us to come back, and then in January of 2008 they asked if we might be interested in serving the Lord here with them. I asked the doctor in Fergus and he thought it would be OK. My health was still pretty frail, but so were the finances here as well. One of our new friends, Ardell Aason, prayed that we would all just trust the Lord for one another one day at a time for the next 20 years.

And so the Lord opened the door. Ten years later, one day at a time, much has changed. But as is the case for each of our lives, nothing that the Lord didn't already know about. Four months after we came our friend Ardell unexpectedly went Home. Five others passed those first two years. Enough so that serving that little church full time was no longer possible. So the Lord added work here with Human Services, and then in December of 2009 an invitation to serve the church in Wallace along with the church here in town. Eight years later, we still make the trip every Sunday morning to Wallace for 9am and then back here for 11:15. Good friends, good ministry shared among us all

In the summer of 2011, one of our friends in Wallace who worked at Prairie Lakes Healthcare System saw an internal posting for PL Home Health and Hospice Pastoral Care. That led to an amazing blending of our two little churches and PLHS for 3 years. All part time, but all fit together as only He could do. And because PL Home Health and Hospice covers all of Northeastern SD from here to Clear Lake to Willow Lake and up to the ND border, that led to pastoral care at many Senior Homes including here at Jenkins, and then the invitation from Loren almost 4 years ago now to come and serve the Lord here with all of you.

It has been four years of His blessing and His ministry in our lives to serve Him here. Still connected with our two small church families, with hospice care here, and memory care, and friendships with residents, families, and this amazing staff of caregivers. Barb and I thank Him, and the entire Jenkins family, for inviting us to be a part of this family. We are honored to serve alongside of you, here... in the Wild Wild West... west of Walmart. Thank you! Thank You, Lord! May You guide us all and bless the work of our hearts and our hands in this place for You in this New Year.
